Tradition 4 Checklist

Some of these questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine. This month's questions reflect questions related to Tradition Four. We hope that these questions will stimulate dialog on practicing these traditions and provide insight into how to practice these principles in all of our affairs.

Tradition Four: Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.

- 1. Do I insist that there are only a few *right* ways groups should be doing things in AA?
- 2. Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA, or of nearby groups?
- 3. When might the actions of a group affect other groups, or AA as a whole?
- 4. Compare the different meetings that you to during the week. How are they similar? How are they different? How do these groups reflect this tradition?
- 5. Am I accepting of how other groups run their meetings? Are there any dealbreakers for me in what kind of meeting I would attend? If there are, is it based upon AA literature, or is it a personal preference?

Answer to Question 1:

I still consider myself a newbie in AA. Steps have shown me how selfish and self-centered I had become. For too long I thought that my way in all things was the only way, even when my way didn't work. Often refusing to listen to the advice or guidance of others often landed me in predicaments I would have never thought I would be in. But being in AA and seeing the history of AA guiding people to better lives without alcohol, I would be selfish to think my ways or ideas would make anything in AA better. If it's not broke, don't fix it. I'm not a fan of change, I prefer the status

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I recently read an article that had that had a couple of sentences that just captured my attention. It read: 'Our response to today's circumstances will tell us more about ourselves. We need not waste energy judging ourselves harshly, but learn from our feelings and reactions.'

Some days I wake up in a bad mood, not often thank goodness. But this sentence made me think why I may wake up in a bad mood. It really came down to Step 10. Did I do a proper inventory at the end of the day and did I leave anything unresolved? Have I called my sponsor lately? Have I attended a meeting lately or have too many days passed since my last meeting? My bad mood is the result of carrying the unclean items from yesterday or the day before into today. It is like the guilt I always carried with me during my drinking days. Then the circumstances of today may not be handled in the best of intentions. And it could certainly pile on to my already bad day.

Step 10 is like spring cleaning. But unlike traditional spring cleaning, I need to do it every day. But my first spring cleaning started with Step 4, where I had the opportunity to look at myself. I needed to see what my character defects were, even though I didn't know I was looking for them. In traditional spring cleaning, I don't just pitch things, but I evaluate what I can do to clean up the mess. Step 4 allowed me to identify the mess in me. Other Steps helped me clean up the mess.

My response to today's circumstances will tell me if I am being selfish, self-centered, impatient and intolerant, among others. When I practice Step 10 daily, I stand a good chance of waking up in a good mood the next morning.

Answer to Question 4:

When I think of the meetings I attend, each meeting does things a little bit differently. Each meeting has different readings and different formats. Some meetings keep the exact same format each week, others have a consistent format for each week of the month, while other meetings may change the meeting format from time to time. One quote that comes to mind is, "variety is the spice of life". By having the different flavors of meetings, it makes the meetings richer and much more meaningful.

It is through this autonomy, and the freedom to govern themselves or control of their own affairs, that meetings get their different flavors. This can be part of the appeal of different groups. While this tradition allows for a lot of freedom, there are limitations. Under tradition 4 in the 12&12, Bill emphasizes that groups, as well as individuals have to stick to spiritual principles, or else they will get sick and die. The 12&12 also emphasizes that sobriety has to be its sole objective.

When I was on a recovery message board prior to being in AA, sobriety being the sole objective was sorely lacking. On this message board, some people wanted to moderate, some people wanted to get sober, some weren't sure what they wanted, while others wanted to discuss numerous personal issues. The wide variety in goals and objectives led to a lot of conflict, and a could be highly distracting in getting and staying sober.

The reason I like that tradition 4, is that gives groups a lot of latitude in carrying the message, as long as they adhere to spiritual principles, don't harm other groups, or AA as a whole. -KS

Stepping into the Sunlight

It is officially springtime! When I look outside, a number of changes are beginning to take place. The days are getting longer, and plants, trees, and flowers are beginning to grow. For some people, they are planting seeds in their gardens, so they can enjoy the harvest of its fruits, later on in the season.

When I think about early sobriety and what is happening in springtime, there are a number of similarities. Much like the people that are planting their gardens, when I got into the program and started to work the steps with my sponsor, seeds were being planted. I had no idea what to expect from planting these seeds or what it would take to nurture these seeds to grow, or if they'd bloom. If you talk to any gardener, planting the seeds is not sufficient for producing a garden, but is a mere beginning. To make a garden, water, sunlight and weeding are also necessary, but you have to have some idea what you're doing. Most of us when we came in had no idea how to tend these seeds we plant in early sobriety. This is where a sponsor is so critical, as they can help nurture these seeds to grow, if their advice is heeded.

So, how do we step into that spiritual sunlight? Under step 11 in the 12&12, while Bill states that meditation is our step into the spiritual sunlight, I personally believe that spiritual sunlight encompasses conscious

contact with God as we understand him, which can be in the form of meditation or prayer. Practicing both prayer and meditation has a number of benefits in sobriety, and each of these practices is distinct. Unless we seek that conscious contact, we are not going to grow. Bill even states, "nothing much can grow in the dark". Thus, increasing our conscious contact with God, or our higher power, is important as soon as we get into the program! I doubt most of us are meditating, but praying each morning and evening is a great beginning!

While God is a major source for growth, Bill also brings up the importance of self-examination. One of my favorite sentences under step 11 in the 12&12 is, "There is a direct linkage among self-examination, meditation, and prayer. Taken separately, these practices can bring much relief and benefit. But when they are logically related and interwoven, the result is an unshakable foundation for life".

Even if our conscious contact with God is increased, if self-examination is neglected, the weeds can overtake the garden and kill off any seeds that are in the midst of growth if we're not careful. This is where a good sponsor can come into play if we haven't gotten to step 10 yet, as they can help us recognize some of these issues and help us weed that garden. At the same point, if weeding is only done, and there isn't that conscious contact with God, the garden isn't going to grow either. However, once we get to working both steps 10 and 11 on a regular basis, those seeds that are planted in early sobriety, begin to grow and eventually bloom. We begin to see what potential our lives hold, and begin to see the person that God always intended for us to be.


