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AA Grapevine Discussion: Why I Love My Home Group

This month, we continue with AA Grapevine discussion questions. We highly encourage our readers to read the AA grapevine article relevant to the discussion, but it is not necessary to have read it or to be familiar with it. We are answering the questions based on our own experience with the hope that our answers will be helpful to our readers.

This month's discussion questions are from May's *AA Grapevine* issue, and are related to Home Groups.

"Do you have a home group? What are some things you love about it? What are some helpful things you've learned there? What commitments have helped you most? What are some ways you've helped the group? Has finding a home group been challenging?"

I came to A.A. by the suggestion of my counselor when I was leaving rehab. I thought the only thing I needed to do to remain sober was attend A.A. meetings. At some of those meetings, they would ask if anyone needed a home group and if they did to see one of the home group members after the meeting. Well, I never liked commitment, so I never asked any of those home group members. I didn't even ask what a home group was, but I kept going to a lot of meetings.

Then I starting working with a sponsor, and he suggested that I get a home group and explained what a home group was. There was one

home group that I knew I could make every week and I liked the few members the home group had, so I joined it. Then I sat back and did nothing for a month or so, but I attended every week. My home group is a discussion meeting, and had been started sometime in December 2000. Attendance was always good. It was the largest attended meeting of the meetings I attended, and there were a lot of regulars in attendance who had their own home groups. I got used to seeing those familiar faces at my meeting every week and looked forward to hearing their comments on the discussion topic.

After a while, I began asking if any help was needed in setting up the meeting and started helping. Things started clicking, and all of a sudden, the great lock down of 2020 shut down all our meetings. I panicked because I couldn't go to my meeting or any other meeting. How was I going to remain sober without meetings? Then I heard about Zoom meetings a few groups were starting, and I liked the idea so I took that to our members. There were only about 4 home group members at the time and I had the most computer skills of them all, so I took the responsibility of setting up the Zoom meetings, which I had to learn how to do. Once that was done. I helped other AA's who needed help in connecting to the Zoom meetings, mine or their home group. Seeing how others struggled to connect to the Zoom meetings. I wrote a guide, "How to join an online AA meeting" and had it posted on the District 18 webpage. Through Zoom, I had my home group meeting back and I was relieved. I never thought I would need my meeting so much when I couldn't go to it.

Eventually in-person meetings would start up again and I began getting to the meeting early to help set up, and make coffee. I soon began to like getting there early, because there were just a few members there setting up for the meeting and we could talk about sobriety or sometimes just talk in general. This is when I started to really get to know my fellow home group members. It was a meeting before the meeting, kind of.

I never realized how valuable a home group could be to my sobriety. We look after each other and let all home group members if we are going to be absent from the meeting. We care about each other's sobriety.

The vital principle of 5th Step is restoring "Integrity". Freedom with gratitude and useful service are the rewards.

Integrity, what in the world does that mean? When I came into A.A., nobody told me anything about integrity. I was amazed at the experiences members shared of their life journey into alcoholism. Early in the program, I couldn't believe some of the things I was sharing. To a normal person, my stories sounded insane. The way I treated family, friends, co-workers, strangers and myself was not in their best interest. Everything about my life had devolved to a bottom that seemed perfectly normal to me, only me. I did whatever it took to keep the alcohol flowing though me. The members that listened to my stories seemed to understand what I was sharing. I came to understand that they had been on that same path, the isolated road to nowhere.

I was working the steps, learning vital principles along the way. The principles of each step weren't clearly identified as I completed each step, yet I either learned them or they were restored. Living with the principles make life better, day by day.

Back to my original question, what does integrity mean? I had to look it up in the dictionary. Integrity means adherence to moral and ethical principles; soundness of moral character; honesty. I learned right away working the 1st step that if I were to succeed in this program and have any chance of remaining sober. I needed to be honest. No more lying. The majority of the problems I carried into the program were due to my dishonest actions and behavior. As the years of drinking went on, the problems kept piling up. Most were forgotten by drinking those away, others forgotten with time. But they were still there, just not at the forefront. There were days where something would happen which would jar a memory of something I had regretted doing. It would make me feel guilty for a moment, until I could drink it away.

Step 5 offered a way to clear my past by admitting to God, myself and another person the exact nature of my wrongs. Having gone to confession with a priest many times in my younger days and now looking back, I realized I'd never given a honest confession. I always held something back, usually because it was too embarrassing to tell the priest. Or I just didn't want to be honest and be held accountable for my actions. This step allowed me to share my all my wrongs and to finally admit those to someone. God was there also, because I asked him to be there. It took a long time to bring it all out. When I was satisfied that nothing had been missed, I spend some time reflecting on what just happened. I finally felt relieved, and my plate was clean. This was the first step into Integrity.

I never again want to live my life like I did in the past. For myself, I have to live a honest life, for without honesty, I will never have Integrity. I found that living a life of moral and ethical principles was so much easier and rewarding. Mark Twain had it right, "If you tell the truth, you don't have to remember anything." Working the steps of A.A. has taught me how to be honest, and because of that, integrity just became part of my life. I'll close with this quote "Integrity is doing the right thing, even when no one is watching."

INTERESTING DATES IN MARCH AA HISTORY

MAY 11 1935: Alone in the lobby of the Mayflower Hotel in Akron OH between the bar & telephone, Bill W. makes 11 phone calls & finally gets Henrietta Seiberling, who introduces him to Dr. Bob.

MAY 12 1935: Bill & Dr. Bob meet for the 1st time in Akron OH at Henrietta Seiberling's Gate House. It was Mother's Day.

MAY 1938: Bill W. & other AA's begin writing the Big Book.

MAY 1939: Clarence S. of Cleveland OH tells Dr. Bob, his sponsor, he won't be back to Oxford Group meetings in Akron & will start "AA" meetings in Cleveland.

MAY 1940: Washington D.C. Sunday Star reports founding of 1st AA group in the nations capitol, meeting every Tuesday night.

MAY 1941: 1st Wisconsin AA meeting was held in a Milwaukee Hotel • Jacksonville FL newspaper reports start of a new AA group.

MAY 1942: The Journal-Herald in Dayton OH runs a huge story on AA, with photos of members in Halloween masks to protect their anonymity.

MAY 1943: In the early days of AA, the Fellowship sought & received more publicity than today. The Sacramento Union newspaper reported "50% of AA 'cures' take effect immediately & are permanent.".

MAY 1950: Shortly before his death, Dr. Bob tells Bill, "I reckon we ought to be buried like other folks."

MAY 1971: Bill W. is buried in small private ceremony in East Dorset VT. Dr. John Morris, AA GSB Chairman, gives the eulogy.


