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## AA Grapevine Discussion: Making Ninth Step Amends

This month, we continue with AA Grapevine discussion questions. We highly encourage our readers to read the AA grapevine article relevant to the discussion, but it is not necessary to have read it or to be familiar with it. We are answering the questions based on our own experience with the hope that our answers will be helpful to our readers.

This month's discussion questions are from September's *AA Grapevine* issue, and are related to Making Ninth Step Amends.

'Share some ways your drinking affected your family. Have you ever made difficult amends with people in your past? How did they go? Was your sponsor helpful? What are some things that helped? How has sobriety helped repair your relationships?'

While I was out there drinking, I never thought my drinking was affecting my family. I was a closet drinker of liquor and drank beer socially. Looking back, it was hard work controlling my drinking just to keep from crossing the threshhold into drunkenness. As long as I could sneak a drink every now and again just to keep myself below the edge, my desire for alcohol was being satisfied. That made it possible for me to give the appearance to others that

I was acting normally. Eyebrows of my family and others were never raised in question by my actions. I could nurse a beer or two all night, while supplementing with gulps of liquor in the back room. I thought I had this drinking game figured out and the game went on for many years. That began to change back in 2013, when my drinking crossed the threshold and family and others began to notice. The last few years were very difficult for my wife and family. I found out when I was in AA that she was seeking outside help for herself and how to deal with me.

So the most difficult amends I made were to my wife, mother, sister and brothers. Besides my wife, the others really had no idea how much I had been drinking. Not only was I a closet drinker, I became a shut-in, rarely seeing my family. I'm sure they saw the my physical deterioration when they did see me occasionally. So having to make amends to them was difficult, for all the years of wrongs and admitting I was a closet drinker.

My sponsor helped me organize my thoughts on how to approach my amends to my wife. And in the time leading up to when I going to make the amends. I wanted to not only disclose my wrongs to her, but also tell her every little secret I kept. Those secrets were where I hid my liquor, that I drank a half pint on the way home from work every day, then more after she went to bed, that I drove around in the country for an hour after cutting my mom's grass drinking a half pint. sometime more. I told her when I was supposed to be looking for a job. I was just sitting around all day drinking. She knew I had a second checking account, but she never looked at that. I told her that is where I withdrew money to buy my liquor. I told her of where I stopped to buy my liquor on my way home from work and after cutting mom's grass. I told her that I threw my empties in the trash at the gas station or any other trash bin out there. But before I told her these things, I was doubting whether I should tell her everything, just in case this AA thing didn't work out. I thought I would need something to fall back on. That was alcohol and insanity talking to me. Sanity, common sense and the program of AA prevailed and I disclosed everything. I said when I entered this program that I was going to work each step fully, as completely as I could. I wasn't going to take short cuts.

The amends to my sister and brothers were using the same formula, but the secrets varied between each of them. But full disclosure of my

secrets were absolutely necessary in my mind. I took this program of honesty very seriously. 'How it works' told me that a few times in the first paragraph.

My life had become nothing but deception, not only to myself, but to all those around me, including my wife and family. I desperately wanted to stop drinking and I wanted to change. I had been living two lives for a long time, one being the nice guy who appeared normal and the other drinking behind everyone's back. My years as a Boy Scout in my youth taught me the values of honesty and service, among other values. Now it was time for change, to live up to those values and the principles of AA. It took AA to teach me these principles to live life. I had to have an honest beginning to a new, sober life.

#### **Tradition 9 Checklist**

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. The D18 newsletter committee felt that republishing these questions related to each tradition would help further the growth of individuals and groups in their understandings of the traditions, and might stimulate some dialogue. This month's questions reflect questions related to Tradition 8.

We continue in providing answers to some of the questions posed, to show how these traditions, which are some of AA's principles, can be practiced in all our affairs.

Tradition Nine: AA, as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.

- 1. Do I still try to boss things in AA?
- 2. Do I resist formal aspects of AA because I fear them as authoritative?

- 3. Am I mature enough to understand and use all elements of the AA program—even if no one makes me do so—with a sense of personal responsibility?
- 4. Do I exercise patience and humility in any AA job I take?
- 5. Am I aware of all those to whom I am responsible in any AA job?
- 6. Why doesn't every AA group need a constitution and bylaws?
- 7. Have I learned to step out of an AA job gracefully—and profit thereby—when the time comes?
- 8. What has rotation to do with anonymity? With humility?

#### **Answer to Question 4**

My first position in AA was as my home group GSR. I had heard at other meetings announcements about upcoming GSR meetings, and asked my home group if we had a GSR, to which they replied no. So I volunteered to be our GSR. I went to every GSR meeting thereafter and learned a lot about how AA functioned.

While at the GSR meetings I often heard of open service positions within the district and committee chairpersons asking if anyone would like to join a particular committee. The newsletter chairperson would ask at each meeting if anyone wanted to join the newsletter committee and each time no one raised their hand. I didn't raise my hand because I didn't think I had anything to offer. I didn't know what it meant to volunteer my time to a committee or what would be required of me. But because the question was being asked. I began thinking about the newsletter. Then one meeting the newsletter chairperson asked the same question, and I raised my hand. I began attending the committee meetings for the newsletter. In the meetings we discussed what the topics might be for the upcoming newsletter.

It had been a really long time since I had written anything, I started off with a small article, more like a top ten list one might remember from David Letterman's late night TV show. The article was 'Top 10 List: Reasons I am thankful to be sober this Thanksgiving' followed by an article, 'Reflections on being sober this Thanksgiving'. I came up with another Top 10 List: 'Why Christmas may be different this year' for the Christmas edition. Each newsletter I expanded my writing while learning how to construct articles.

**SEPT 1935:** Hank P., the NY group's AA #2, takes his last drink, but after four years of sobriety, he goes back to drinking again.

**SEPT 13 1937:** Florence R. is the 1<sup>st</sup> female AA in NY.

SEPT 1938: Bill W. & Hank P. form Works Publishing Co. to raise money to write & publish "Alcoholics Anonymous", our Big Book. Fitz M.'s sister Agnes lends Bill W. & Hank P. \$1,000 to help them get through the Big Book project.

**SEPT 1939:** The 1<sup>st</sup> AA group in Chicago IL was founded.

SEPT 1940: Bill W. makes a 12<sup>th</sup> Step call on Bobbie V., who later replaces Ruth Hock as the NY office secretary.

SEPT 1940: The AA Bulletin found nine "secure" groups in NYC, Washington D.C., Detroit, Chicago, Houston, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Akron & Cleveland.

SEPT 1940: Bill W. makes a 12<sup>th</sup> Step call on Bobbie V., who later replaces Ruth Hock as the NY office secretary.

**SEPT 1943:** Tuscon AZ Star reported an AA group with eight men & 3 women.

**SEPT 1944: "The Empty Jug" an early AA newsletter) starts in Chattanooga TN.** 

**SEPT 1949:** 1<sup>st</sup> issue of the AA Grapevine in pocketbook format is published.

**SEPT 17 1954:** Bill D. (AA #4) dies.

**SEPT 1973:** AA Archives is established at the GSO in NY.
